


Intra-Africa trade and tariff profile



lvory Coast is a member of both the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) and the Community of Sahel-Saharan States (CEN-SAD)

CEN-SAD currently has 24 member states aspiring to the establishment of an Economic Union which includes the free movement of goods. Although CEN-SAD was revived in 2013 with a revision of the CEN-SAD Treaty there is still no free trade agreement in place.

All 15 ECOWAS countries are part of the ECOWAS Free Trade Area and all but Cape Verde are in the process of implementing the ECOWAS Common External Tariff (CET). In 2017 Mauritania and ECOWAS signed an Association Agreement for the readmission of Mauritania to the REC by 2019; Morocco's application to join ECOWAS has been granted 'in principle', but is awaiting final approval and Tunisia has recently obtained ECOWAS observer status.

The main imports for Ivory
Coast from non-REC countries
include frozen fish; vehicles;
petroleum oils;
iron & steel and cruise ships
among others.

These products are levied an applied duty of between 5% and 20%.

The highest MFN rates applied are 35%.

The AfCFTA provides an opportunity for Ivory Coast to diversify its product base and expand its market beyond ECOWAS.
