

The Final Ac ecommended that UNCTAD "should promote, within the United Nations family, arrangements for intergovernmental action for the simplifica elating to customs procedures, commercial travel, etc." Over the following years, UNCTAD's continued work on trade facilitation led to the Un national Symposium on Trade Efficiency, organized in 1994 in Columbus, Ohio (United States of America) and the Columbus Ministerial D ficiency. 


To date, 87 WTO Members have presented Category A notifications, and 5 have submitted Category B and C ones.
